



Smooth operators

ENTERPRISING pupils are in the running to win a national competition launched to find Wales' savviest students.

The Enterprise Troopers competition – part of Welsh Government's Youth Entrepreneurship programme – was launched in May 2013 to inspire entrepreneurship in primary schools and challenge pupils across Wales to develop their own business ideas ahead of a national final this March.

School pupils from Ysgol Abererch turned left-over milk into a thriving smoothie business, created *Smw-fi* after their school caretaker asked them to devise a use for milk left over at the end of a school week.

The pupils mind-mapped their business idea and undertook tasting sessions to develop their own smoothie product complete with label design and logo.

Annwen Hughes, head teacher at Ysgol Abererch, said: "The children involved are only five but it's amazing how much they've learned about business; they can even explain how to make a profit".

Ysgol Abererch won the Foundation Phase award at the regional final in Llandudno.

Ysgol Pont-Y-Gof, Botwnnog, and Ysgol Y Garreg, Llanfrothen, won Key Stage Two awards for their business ideas, while Ysgol Pont-Y-Gof also collected a special Environmental Award.

A group of year three pupils from Ysgol Pont-y-Gof starting making and selling their own Jam, called Cecin Y Gof, while Ellie Gwen Williams, a pupil at Ysgol Y Garreg in Llanfrothen, also received the Star Trooper Award for her efforts.

Now Ysgol Aberech, Ysgol Pont-y-Gof and Ysgol Y Garreg will go head to head with others from across Wales in a bid to become the national winners of Enterprise Troopers at a grand final at the Senedd in Cardiff, to be held on March 25th.
